GUEST SPEAKER February 16, 2024 Sylvester McIntosh, USMC 1965-1968 Silver Star

Vietnam veterans lauded for heroic deeds often deflect the praise by saying they had no choice but to act as they did. **Marine Sgt. Sylvester McIntosh**, who received the Silver Star for his bravery during a battle in Vietnam, is one such person. McIntosh, a squad leader with Company A, 1st Battalion, 9th Marines, was out on a search-and-destroy operation in Quang Tri province on May 13, 1967, when his unit came under heavy fire from the North Vietnamese Army.

Shot in his chest while assisting a wounded Marine, McIntosh carried that man to safety and returned to make two more rescues before collapsing. One of the men he rescued died. He doesn't know the fate of the others. "I was trying to cover my butt and trying to get my buddies home," McIntosh recalled recently. "Other people may call me a hero, but I was doing what I was trained to do."

McIntosh's platoon had just cleared one village and had stepped aside to let a second platoon take over to clear the second village. "And when they got in, the enemy did what we call a horseshoe," McIntosh recalled. "They closed the horseshoe on the second platoon, with me following up."

His platoon formed a reverse horseshoe, and he and his corpsmen went in to recover the wounded and dead. While retrieving the first casualty, he got hit in the chest when his flak jacket slipped open and allowed a bullet to enter.

McIntosh went back to the United States for care and spent two months at Naval Air Station Jacksonville, Florida. After release, he served a year at Parris Island, S.C., before returning home to Wabasso, FL.

He worked first at Piper Aircraft in Vero Beach and then for the U.S. Postal Service. In between, he earned a bachelor's degree in business and a doctorate in religious education.


A minister affiliated with the Church of God of Cleveland, Tenn., he has been the pastor of three churches in Florida and continues to preach to this day.

McIntosh says he was religious before he joined the military, but his experience that day in Quang Tri changed his life. "God spoke to me that day ... And his words to me: 'You're gonna get hit, but you're not going to get killed. I've got much work for you to do.' So I've been pastoring ever since I got out."

Sgt. Walter Ehlers **D-Day - Medal of Honor Submitted by Terry Treat Edited by Robert Scheppy**



World War II Medal of Honor Recipient Walter Ehlers 1921-2014

On June 6, 1944, Sgt. Walter Ehlers went ashore at Omaha Beach. Later in June 1944 near Goville, France. Sgt. Ehlers repeatedly led his men against heavily defended enemy strongpoints, exposing himself to deadly hostile fire whenever the situation required heroic and courageous leadership.

Sgt. Ehlers, far ahead of his men, led his squad against a strongly defended enemy territory, personally killing four enemy soldiers who attacked him. Then crawling forward under withering machine-gun fire, he attacked the German gun-crew and put it out of action.

Turning his attention to two enemy mortar teams protected by the crossfire of two machine guns, Sgt. Ehlers led his men through this hail of bullets to kill and force a retreat of the enemy mortar teams, killing three Growing up in Greenwich, CT, Mort Walker, was men himself.

After mopping up the mortar positions, he again advanced on a machine gun, his progress effectively covered by his squad. When he was almost on top of the gun, he leaped to his feet and knocked out the position singlehandedly.


The next day, having advanced deep into enemy territory, the platoon of which Sgt. Ehlers was a member finding itself in an untenable position as the enemy brought increased mortar, machine-gun, and smallarms fire to bear on it, was ordered to withdraw.

Sgt. Ehlers, after his squad had covered the withdrawal of the remainder of the platoon, stood up and by continuous fire at the semicircle of enemy placements, diverted the bulk of the heavy hostile fire on himself, thus permitting the members of his own squad to safely withdraw.

At this point, though wounded himself, he carried his wounded automatic rifleman to safety and returned to retrieve the automatic rifle which he was unable to carry previously. After having his wound treated, he refused to be evacuated, and returned to lead his squad.

Sgt. Ehlers also earned three Purple Hearts and a Silver Star during his service with the 3rd Infantry Division and the 1st Infantry Division.

After the war, Walters Ehlers became an advocate for military veteran benefits and proudly worked as a security guard for Disneyland when it opened in California.
